### FIRE-FIGHTING

Mr. J. O'Mahony, in common with many of our seagoing personnel, attended the Liverpool firefighting course. He has very kindly described the course for us and has expressed some views about the application of the lessons learned to shipboard routine.

During the first day of the course the Chemistry of fire is studied and the theory of extinguishing fire by removing a side from the "Fire Triangle". A lecture is given on fixed firefighting installations and the detection and prevention of fire on board ship. The class is taught how to deal with fire on board while the vessel is in port and how best to co-operate with the local fire services.

The second day is devoted to practical firefighting, each person on the course being given the opportunity of extinguishing various types of fires in the "ship unit" provided. Members are shown how the cooler atmosphere is at the lowest level when approaching the fire and how the smoke changes colour from black to light grey when the water has found the seat of the fire. The effectiveness of spray nozzles is demonstrated.

Each person is also given the opportunity of entering the smoke filled ship unit while wearing various types of breathing apparatus. Very valuable experience is gained during this exercise and one appreciates the difficulties of operating under such conditions.

### CARE AND MAINTENANCE

On the third and final day, theoretical and practical instructions are given on the various types of portable fire extinguishers, with emphasis being placed on their care and maintenance and on using the correct type for

each particular class of fire.

A lecture is also given on the various types of hoses available and the proper care to be given to each. The best type of hose available at the moment has a rubber interior, cast to a plastic or rubber exterior with a layer of terylene between. The terylene provides the strength, while the rubber serves the purpose of reducing the friction of the water passing through. The exterior surface of rubber or plastic is to prevent abrasion.

During the course three films, namely, Chemistry of Fire, Using Water Wisely and

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The Company has been considering the introduction of a new Deck Rank that of 4th Officer — on our larger vessels and decided to give the idea a try-out on the "Irish Larch" and the "Irish Alder". One of the Cadets appointed was Mr. Brian O'Flynn and in this article he gives his impressions of a voyage he completed while holding the experimental rank.

I joined the Irish Larch on June 9th last as 4th Officer for a round voyage to South Africa via Continental Ports. We loaded a cargo at Glasgow, Swansea, Bremen, Rotterdam and Antwerp.

During the coastal run I stood 4 to 8 watch with the Chief Officer. I doubled up as lookout and put positions on the Chart, which he checked, and in various circumstances of crossing traffic I compared what he did against what I should have done.

Sailing between the loading ports I kept the Movement Book, looked after the boarding and disembarking of Pilots and took charge of signalling.

### CARGO WATCHES

If on day work only, two Officers were constantly on deck along with the Chief Officer. Nearing the completion of cargo it was arranged for the Officer with the first full sea-watch to have time off before sailing and be on standby, the other Officers on watch checking gear. When overtime was worked, the Chief Officer and 3rd Officer were on day duty and the 2nd and 4th Officers did the late duty, the Chief Officer being on call as needed. Of course, there were instances when all Officers and Cadets had to standby on cargo duty to prevent pilferage.

### AT SEA

After we sailed Antwerp for South Africa on July 9th, I went on 8 to 12 watch, the 3rd and 2nd Officers moving ahead one watch and the Chief Officer going on day work. The Work Study Team had come aboard at Antwerp so the Chief Officer was able to devote the full day to assisting them in their analysis.

### SOUTH AFRICAN COAST

We called at a total of ten ports for loading and discharging. At Mossel Bay, a surf port, the vessel loaded at anchor from Lighters.

From Capetown up the coast we changed our docking stations because of late and early arrivals and departures. Where the 3rd Officer

would have little sleep before his midnight to 4 a.m. watch, it was decided to leave him off stations for the 6 a.m. docking, and I handled the telegraphs and walkie-talkies as well as the movement book. The 3rd Officer would then come on cargo watch later in the day, leaving the 2nd Officer and I to divide the rest of the time off between us to catch a couple of hours sleep before sailing again that evening.

In Port Elizabeth the advantage of having a 4th Officer on board became very apparent when the Irish Larch was forced to shift after a full day's work on cargo to allow the Union Castle Liner Transval Castle to leave the harbour. It meant that the heavy excess hours could be broken up and the work load on the normal complement of officers lessened, leaving everyone fresh for the following day's

From what I experienced on the trip to South Africa, the rank of 4th Officer worked out very well. It took the excess work off the other officers and meant a more efficient working of the ship.

I think it is a very good idea to consider the permanent adoption of the rank of 4th Officer on some of our ships. It would give a Cadet an added incentive to work and to merit this promotion.

## Newfoundland to Fiji on the "Irish Ash"

The end of June. It was a cold grey day as we nosed our way down the Mersey past the Bar lightvessel and into the north Irish Sea. Before us stretched a four month charter to King Line with our first stop Cornerbrook, Newfoundland. The British Seamen's strike was still on though it looked as if it would soon reach a settlement. As far as we knew, we were loading paper either for the U.K. or for Australia. No one seemed to know for sure and speculation was rife. The weather held fair enough—even for the North Atlantic and early in July we arrived safe and sound at Cornerbrook.

Irish ships have often traded in and out of Cornerbrook, but for some of us it was a first time. It is a fair-sized town, sprawling but with a very friendly and cheerful atmosphere. Strangely though, the female population far outnumbers the male and, most striking, nearly all of these are quite young. In fact, the place had the air of being a young town. The rig-of-the-day seemed to be slacks and sweaters or blouses, and some charmingly cheeky figures were to be seen.

Here we learnt that we were loading for Australia and soon carpenters were swarming all over us, laying the timber flooring that is a necessary part of a paper cargo. Here too the sun shone and it was pleasantly warm, giving us a foretaste of our voyage to the southern hemisphere and the land of "Down Under"!

Within a week of leaving Newfoundland we were in the thick tropical heat and humidity of the Caribbean. Once bunkered, we commenced our transit of the Panama Canal and as this was at night there was not really much to see. The locks of course are enormous, but the myriad vari-coloured lights and illuminations of the Canal were a sight in themslves. They made the tropical night glow with a fairyland of colour. The effortless speed and efficiency with which we were handled, especially in the locks, where we were controlled by the latest electric trains, or "mules" as they are called, would have to be experienced to be appreciated.

### ACROSS THE PACIFIC

At first, the weather wasn't too hot and as we were going into a winter climate it never got unbearably so. Day after day passed with pleasant light winds and bright warm sun, with a sparklingly rippled deep blue sea.

In the middle of August we arrived in Australia, where we got a quick discharge. Chief memories would include Brisbane in the Sunshine State—it poured. In Sydney and Melbourne it was warm and cloudy, but mostly dry with some scattered showers in Sydney. Where to next? Finally we found out. Fiji—to load sugar for Europe.

When Fiji is mentioned, one thinks of coral islands, swaying palm trees and thick rich green foliage, with slightly dusky maidens in sarongs peeping from between the leaves. Well, the coral islands are there—all 3,000 of them. Of course, some of these are really only coral reefs and atolls, but there are still an awful lot of small islands, all covered in luxuriant verdant growth with beautiful white sandy beaches set below the bluest of blue skies with a few white fleecy clouds, and all around the warm, sparkling Pacific Ocean. As one approaches the land, the colour of the water changes through various shades of sea blue until it becomes a beautiful sea green, with patches of white sand and multi-coloured coral showing in the depths. And darting in and out, multitudes of fish of all sizes and hues. There are sharks too-big, deadly ones.

The two main islands of Fiji are named Viti Levu and Vanua Levu; and Suva, the main port, is on the south eastern coast of Viti Levu. We put in here for a few hours to pick up Fijiian shore labour and shore equipment. These workers would live on board until we had finished loading. The Fijiian is really more Melanesian than Polynesian, though not as dark as a negro. In fact, within a very short time we were finding no difficulty in recognising their various features. We had received a warning about thievery, so that night and part of the next day the accommodation echoed to the unusually strange sound of cabin doors being locked and unlocked. But we needn't have bothered. Once clear of Suva, bound for Labasa on the north-west coast of Vanua Levu -about twelve hours' steaming-we discovered we had no need to fear any depredation from our guests.

Next day, after treading our way past reefs, atolls and small scattered islands, we came to anchor between two promontories of land in fairly shallow water. Hardly had the anchor rattled down than towing launches brought barges alongside laden with bags of sugar. Our lads' job was to slit open these bags over a break in the hatch-covers and empty them into the holds and they turnedto with a will.

Labasa itself is a small settlement close to the sugar mill, and is about ten miles up river from where we anchored. One way to go ashore was to take a launch to a landing stage about a mile and a half away and then take a taxi the seven or eight miles into Labasa. The taxi ride cost about fifteen shillings. Although this was the quick way, the slower, alternative route was to hop aboard one of the towing launches and return up river with it to the sugar mill. This was by far the best route, because it was over an hour's run of pure scenic beauty. Once out of sight of the ship the river narrowed, with thick verdant growth down to the water's edge, and great tall trees, some of them meeting overhead, creating patches of shade and light. And over all, a stillness broken only by the throb of the launch and the twitters and whistles of vari-hued birds as they flitted among the trees.

Our Fijiians had constructed their own galley on the after deck with timber and drum stoves and they had their own cooks. In the late evening, a delicious aroma would waft into the still air as one of the cooks



banged on a piece of tubing to summon the gangs to their meal. In the heat of the sun the steel decks would be roasting hot, yet those fellows walked about in their bare

feet with complete unconcern!

Although there was over a hundred of them on board, there was never any sign of ill-feeling amongst them and they were a happy lot. In the late evening, after the sun had gone down, those who had finished work for the day would congregate together on the hatch-tops and sharing a bucket of their non-alcoholic beverage—Kava Kava would start to sing. Singing seemed to be their pride and joy and it was really wonderful to hear their native Fijiian songs, all sung in parts and in beautiful harmony. Altogether, they appeared to be a very happy, carefree bunch.

While at Labasa a British frigate, H.M.S. Ajax, arrived on a courtesy call. Within a couple of days we departed for Lautoka to finish loading, leaving Ajax as the sole vessel at anchor at Labasa. I don't know what speed these frigates are capable of, but imagine our surprise next morning when we were arriving at Lautoka to find the Ajax already nice and snug alongside! However, she didn't stay long and on the following morning she departed and we then had Lautoka all to ourselves.

Lautoka is situated on the west coast of Vitu Levu and here we were to finish loading. This time we were across the end of a jetty and the bags of sugar came down to us on

a very narrow gauge railway.

The town itself is about a mile from the berth and although a hot tropical sun blazed from a clear azure sky, the humidity was low enough not to make the walk there and back unpleasantly sticky. There were plenty of taxis and the fares were reasonable, but on the whole we still preferred to walk. A huge Indian population inhabits the town and all the businesses there are run by them. As Lautoka is a tourist port of call after Suva, there are many duty-free shops.

### FITZPATRICK AGAIN

However, all good things must come to an end and so, on Monday, the 19th September, after our all too brief visit, we landed our guests and their equipment and, with the lush green land on one hand and a dazzling white coral reef on the other, we said farewell to the hauntingly friendly islands of Fiji.

### **IRISH SYCAMORE**

It is ten o'clock in the morning at the Sandheads (Calcutta) Anchorage in the Indian Ocean where some sixty ships are awaiting berths to discharge their cargoes of "Famine Relief" grain. Many of these ships have been waiting for over a month due to congestion at the port. Suddenly, across the still waters ring out the melodious strains of "Mick McGilligan's Daughter, Mary Ann The music and song is provided by the "Irish Sycamore" group in their daily programme broadcast over the ship's loudspeaker system. The group consists of accordeonist and tinwhistle player Tommy Kennedy, and Bernard Sweetman on sax, with singers Cormac Louth, Edward Kelly and Richard Egan. Tommy Kennedy also figures prominently with a selection of ballads while Andrew Austin is the versatile disc-jockey. Even the breaks are utilised for commercials by specialist 'ad-man' Cormac Louth.

The "Irish Sycamore" arrived at Calcutta on the 17th September and finally sailed from there on the 9th November, almost two months later. Captain Colman Raftery was highly appreciative of the work done by the members of the ships musical and variety group to while away the long hours spent at anchor. The programmes were all pre-recorded on tape and our broadcast to the ships personnel over the loudspeaker system, coming "on the air" at 10 a.m. each morning.

Of course, the vessel's stay in Calcutta was not entirely uneventful otherwise. Because fresh-water was running low the Sycamore had to make a sixty mile journey up the river Hoogly to Diamond Harbour to

take on fresh supplies. A cyclone also hit the area during the vessel's sojurn at Sandheads but fortunately no damage was suffered, although some of the ships anchored close by did sustain considerable damage.

A visit to the races in Calcutta was one of the highlights of the stay for Captain Raftery, his companions on that occasion being Mr. John Mitchell and Mrs. Mitchell.

After discharging her grain cargo the "SYCAMORE" loaded generals at Calcutta where Captain J. A. Caird took over command from Captain Raftery. Subsequently the vessel called at Penang and took on bunkers at Singapore. While at Singapore, Mr. John Caffrey joined the vessel to replace Mr. Andrew Austin, Chief Cook, who was hospitalized at Calcutta. Mr. Austin has since returned home and we wish him a speedy recovery. Discharge ports for the ship are New Orleans, Mobile, Houston and Vera Cruz.

The "IRISH SYCAMORE" is on Time Charter to Nedlloyd Lijnen of Amsterdam until January next.

### IRISH SPRUCE

Two Aberdeen Angus Heifers were on board the "Irish Spruce" when she left Dublin for New York on 17th November. One of the animals gave birth to a calf while the ship was on passage, but unfortunately the calf was stillborn.

After New York the "Irish Spruce" will call to Wilmington, and Philadelphia before returning to New York to complete her Eastbound cargo for Dublin, Cork and Limerick. Present indications are that the ship will be in Cork for the Christmas period.

### IRISH ASH

The "Irish Ash" signed on her present crew at Rotterdam on 28th October, and sailed from that port on 2nd November for Antwerp to load steel which she discharged at Montreal. She is at present loading Newsprint at Three Rivers and Quebec for London. It is anticipated that the "Irish Ash" will be in London for Christmas Day.

On her voyage from Antwerp to Montreal

the "Ash" was on Charter to Furness Shipping & Agency Co. S.A. of Antwerp, while her present charterers are Transatlantic Carriers. Master of the ship is Capt. J. S. Kerr, while her Chief Engineer is Mr. Peter Otter. Our congratulations are extended to Mr. Otter on his recent success in obtaining a motor endorsement to his Chief Engineer's Certificate.

### IRISH FIR

On time Charter to Carribean Shipping Co., the "Irish Fir" loaded a cargo of steel at Bilbao for Vera Cruz, where she is due to arrive on 10th December.

The present crew of the vessel signed on at Ardrossan on 3rd October.

Mr. L. G. O'Duffy, Second Officer, underwent an operation for Appendicitis, while the vessel was at Bilbao, and he is now back home and we wish him a speedy recovery. Mr. Michael Colemen was tranferred from the "Rose" to replace Mr. O'Duffy.

### IRISH HOLLY

Engineer Officer Cadets Anthony Byrne and James Brady joined the "Irish Holly" recently as part of their training programme. It is intended that such experience on the "Holly" will be given to other Cadets to

familiarise them with reciprocating machinery, and this experience will be of immense benefit to them in their future careers. This vessel continues to trade between various British and Irish ports with Capt. M. O'Connell as Master and Mr. T. Barry, Chief Engineer.

### **IRISH ROSE**

The ship signed on a new crew at Rotterdam, where Captain M. R. McMahon, took over command, Mr. J. J. Reid, continuing as Chief Engineer. One of the particularly pleasant aspects of the sign-off and sign-on at Rotterdam was the fact that the honorary Irish Consul at Rotterdam, Mr. Veder, accompanied by his Chancellor, Mr. F. Steehouwer, attended to the consular formalities on the spot. Before Mr. Veder's official appointment, it was necessary to hire a coach and transport the ship's personnel to the Hague, some thirty miles from Rotterdam for the purpose of signing ship's Articles. As all the ship's complement obviously could not be taken at once, it was always necessary to make two trips to the Hague.

At present the "Irish Rose" is on her way to Marina di Carrara with a cargo of marble

slabs from Lisbon.

### IRISH POPLAR

Capt. E. C. G. Horne is back again on the "Irish Poplar" which carried a substantial export cargo on her last trip to the U.S. including large consignments of Chocolate Confectionery, Whiskey, Textiles, Stout and twelve Cattle. As in the case of the "Spruce", one of the Heifers gave birth to a calf on the voyage, but in this case, the calf died after birth. The "Poplar" will be due in New York about 18th December, according to present indications.

On the 14th November, after fourteen months trading on the Caribbean, the "Irish Rose" completed her Time Charter with Melville Shipping and Trading Company of Trinidad. Home and enjoying a well earned rest are Captain J. Flanagan and Mr. Richard Gaffney, Chief Steward, both of whom spent the full term with the "Rose".

### IRISH MAPLE

Drydocked at Barclay Curles of Glasgow on 27th September to undergo Loadline survey, L.S.A. survey and to have some other repair jobs carried out. McGregor Hatch towing chains were fitted as well as new Panama fairleads which were fitted to comply with the new regulations for transit through the Panama Canal. Other jobs done included the fitting of a new opening system for hatch covers, a new system to aid the cleaning of holds, the scaling and painting of deep tanks, and the extension of air lines which will permit the scaling hammers to cover the entire length of the ship.

Damage sustained last May when the "Maple" was involved in collision with the "Eurydamus" at Marmagoa", was also repaired.

The vessel finally left the drydock on 12th October and loaded iron and steel products at Antwerp for discharge at Toronto. After unloading her cargo in Toronto the "Maple" loaded grain at Fort William for the West Coast of U.K.

The crew signed off the vessel at Glasgow on 27th September and most of the personnel re-joined again on 8th October after a welcome few days at home.

### IRISH ALDER

Having discharged her eastbound cargo which included the much published locomotives for C.I.E. the "Alder" continues on her scheduled service to Canada. She is expected back in Dublin about a week before Christmas. From her personnel we have received a number of seasonal greetings for publication. ### IRISH OAK

Our Operations Department and Dock Staff were full of praise for the work of the men on the "Irish Oak" when she arived in Dublin on 8th November with six locomotives. The fact that all was in readiness on board to commence discharge almost immediately contributed in no small way to the exceptionally fast turn round which this vessel achieved in Dublin.

As well as hitting the headlines on her inward trip the "Oak" has also made history on her present outward voyage by carrying the largest ever Canada-bound consignment of chocolate products exported by Urney Limited. Worth approximately £150,000, the 900 tons of chocolate carried by the vessel is for discharge at Montreal and Toronto.

#### IRISH CEDAR

The "Irish Cedar" underwent her annual load-line survey in Liverpool prior to loading a cargo of steel at Newport for discharge at Detriot and Chicago. While in Liverpool some minor repairs were carried out and the vessel was partially fitted out to comply with the new Panama regulation On her previous trip the "Cedar" had brought a cargo of sugar from the Fiji Islands to the U.K. When the vessel copletes discharge at Chicago she will proceed to Duluth to load a full cargo of grain for discharge at Rotterdam. She is expected to arrive at Rotterdam about 11th December.

Captain B. Reilly, who joined the "Cedar" in Australia last August is Master and Chief Engineer is Mr. J. Johnson.

### "IRISH ROWAN"

The "Irish Rowan" which is on Time Charter to Companies Transporte Arroya, Panama, loaded a cargo of scrap at the Southern Scrap Company wharf, New Orleans, for discharge at Japan. To protect the pipework in the holds, special protective materials were fitted before the scrap was loaded. On her way to the loading berth she went through the Industrial Canal and passed the Bolands' Machine Corporation repair yard where the "Sycamore" underwent repairs in July 1965. The "Sycamore" also rode out the fury of Hurricane Betsy at this spot.

After loading her cargo the "Rowan" proceeded to the sea via the Tidewater Channel—the first of the Company's vessels to take this route on her way out of New Orleans. The usual route is to go back down the Mississippi.

After completing her present voyage the "Rowan" will return to the west coast of Mexico to load a cargo of grain for Japan.

Mr. James Madigan of the Deck Department joined the vessel at New Orleans.



## ON HIGHER EDUCATION

By A Graduate

The wife was bent on sending our five-year-old to a superior class of school — one where the pupils paid fees, wore blazers and learned elocution. Our social standing, she insisted, demanded that our child be spared the vulgarities of a system designed for the education of ordinary people. At this stage of our evolution, you see, we had attained to semi-detached opulence, and dis-

played fitted carpet in the hall.

Myself, I voiced misgivings about the plan. Not that there was anything particularly wrong with the private school, and I conceded they would teach the kid all the right subjects. But what worried me was the child's education. It seemed a terrible injustice to deprive him of the real flavour of life awaiting him at the National school. Remembering my own young days in the rough and tumble of a city establishment where, if we learned little or nothing formal we gained a rich and wonderful experience, I thought it a great pity for the boy to miss a similiar chance.

The matter was decided by the wife's uncle, the Canon. He was one of the fifteen priests (still the county record) at our Wedding. The Canon is one of the old Sagart—Aroon no nonsense school of clergy, and the wife has a great respect for his judgement. He was unequivocal. "You can't beat the National School training for youngsters", declared the Canon, and so the National School it was.

Don't mind Telefis Eireann. The school around our corner is not the same. It takes two Gardai to control the cars, mostly six-seaters, coming mornings and afternoons to deposit and collect the hordes of smug and overdressed little horrors. The teachers are actually nice to their charges — perhaps even a little deferential. The boys know not the meaning of "mitching" or "boxin the fox". It is all very sad, even if the wife is consoled.

Things were vastly different in my old school. It was war all the way, city versus agriculture, no quarter given or expected. Our teachers to a man came from some weird foreign place called "the country". They loathed and despised us jackeens, and we in

turn systematically drove them all insane. They sneered at our accents, and at our sounding of "skewel" for school, and "kyeow" for cow. We knew nothing about the wonders of nature, life on the farm, footing turf or threshing corn, and we would never know a word of Irish because we didn't have "the blas".

We didn't mind a bit because we knew that all teachers were crazy anyway and foisted on us as a consequence of original sin. In spite of continuous hammerings we laughed, lazed, did no homework and mitched frequently. Some lads even went "on gur", which, for the uneducated, means hiding out for days in a tent on the perimeter of the city in some field or quarry—strictly incommunicado. The stalwarts who resorted to going "on gur" were our real heroes.

Three teachers I remember with special affection, probably because they never attempted to teach, but concentrated passing the time in a manner calculated to cause the minimum of damage to their mental residues. Anyway, it seems that by the time they got to us, they had abandoned all ambitions to be disseminators of knowledge. The first one I recall was a big red-headed Kerryman, known to us as "the Badger". A curious mixture, he was passionately devoted to the ideals of Cuchulain, Finn McCool, Brian Boru and all our ancient heroes, and one, and only one place on earth had any meaning for him, and that was Contae Ciarraighe. preached the Spartan life, and practised it every bitter frostly morning by turning off the hot pipes while exhorting us to "do the hard thing", adding that Finn and the Fianna, St. Patrick and St. Columcille always did the hard thing; reminding us that selfdenial was good for the soul. His next step. repeated unfailingly every day was to put us writing an essay on "Conta Ciarraighe". He always gave us a lead by writing on the blackboard "Ta me chun cunntas do scriobh ar Chontae Chiarraighe". We copied that much, never got any farther, and switched to reading comics while he went to the end of the room to grow peas in jam-pots. He was highly successful with us.

The next one that stands out in my

memory was a lumbering giant of a Cork man christened "two-ton-Tony" the day he arrived with us. We greatly enjoyed "two-ton" because not only did he ignore all lessons, but he constantly sought rows with and threatened the other teachers. A number of times he actually lifted one up and shook him, all the while promising to pitch the victim out the window, and on these occasions his rich Cork accent sounded sweet music to us. He spent the day cutting-out and fashioning hurley sticks, and he allowed us to take practice shots from one end of the room to the other. Nobody dared stop him.

Lastly, there was the unfortunate "Gammy" - the Head who arrived as we moved into the senior classes. Poor old "Gammy" had ideas of modernisation and reform. He began by trying to revive the defunct custom of pupils paying modest school fees. This was the biggest joke ever heard by teachers and pupils alike. At first, he sent messengers around the classes - "would all those who brought in their school fees please proceed etc." The request was always greeted by a spontaneous burst of loud and derisive laughter. He then tried coming around in person, polite at first, begging, beseeching, later firm, and finally frantic, but all to no avail. He got to the stage where he used to burst into the room, interrupt the teacher, and shout at us: "when I say one' I want everybody to say school fees," and of course, we responded with acclamation.

As time went on he resorted to raffles for pet rabbits, turkeys, foot-ball boots, even for vegetables from his garden — all in a desperate effort to pay overheads. Fees became known as rabbit money, cabbage money and boot money.

Years afterwards I met "Gammy" and he asked me if I would care to buy a ticket.

### PORT OF CORK

Mr. Pat Crowley, our local Manager, represented the Company at the first annual dinner of the Port of Cork Ship Agents Association held on November 8th, Among the attendance was Mr. E. Childers, Minister for Transport and Power who said in the course of a speech that Cork was the second most important port in the country, handling 40% of the total trade including Whitegate Oil traffic. Exports from the port had increased by 87% between 1956 and 1965. The Minister declared that congestion at the port would have to be eliminated and the port equipped to meet the requirements of unitised traffic. Improvement plans envisaged the development of the Tivoli Indusrial Estate including the provision of new wharfage for general cargo, container traffic and livestock; for a car ferry service and a passenger terminal, and also for the reservicing of part of the city Quays. The work would be phased over a period of eight years and was expected to cost in the region of £2 million.

The Minister said that if our exports were to go on increasing we would have to cut our costs by speeding up the movement of cargo through our Ports. His own Department, in conjunction with a representative from Coras Trachtala, was trying to devise a better scheme for the clearing of goods through Customs and examining ways and means of cutting down on documents. The Minister concluded by saying that any overall plan for the speeding up of cargo working at our Ports must include a provision to give dock workers security of employment.
